About this Episode

This episode of *iQ: smartparent* discusses the importance of social emotional learning, and how building confidence leads to success in the classroom and in life. Learn how digital media can be used to teach social-emotional skills and social awareness skills in children. This episode will also introduce an exciting science program for girls which focuses on self-esteem and confidence as keys to female academic success in the STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) field.

Discussion Questions

- 1. After watching this episode, how can you use technology and media as means to teach social and emotional learning in your home?
- 2. Do you talk about good role model portrayals in media with your children? What about examples of conflict resolution, empathy, coping with feelings, and collaboration?
- 3. Why do you think Temple and Venneasha's message of self-esteem is so crucial to the success of their STEAM program for girls?
- 4. Temple and Venneasha's STEAM program fuses make-up and science together to get girls interested in STEAM related fields. How can you or your child's school do something similar to encourage students of different cultural backgrounds to take an interest in STEAM?
- 5. How can you build real life experiences from what is being taught on your child's educational apps? Do you use your child's favorite characters as role models for empathy and compassion when faced with a real-life situation?
- 6. Are there positive role models for social emotional development in the media that your child consumes? If not, can you think of some positive ones to introduce to your child? Do you discuss the implications of negative role models for social emotional development?



Here are some questions you can ask your child which can help foster social emotional learning:

1. SELF-AWARENESS	 What are my thoughts and feelings? What causes those thoughts and feelings? How can I express my thoughts and feelings respectfully?
2. SELF-MANAGEMENT	 What different responses can I have to an event? How can I respond to an event as constructively as possible?
3. SOCIAL AWARENESS	 How can I better understand other people's thoughts and feelings? How can I better understand why people feel and think the way they do?
4. RELATIONSHIP SKILLS	 How can I adjust my actions so that my interactions with different people turn out well? How can I communicate my expectations to other people? How can I communicate with other people to understand and manage their expectations of me?
5. RESPONSIBLE DECISION MAKING	 What consequences will my actions have on myself and others? How do my choices align with my values? How can I solve problems creatively?

Hedda Sharapan started as Assistant Director at the very first taping of Mister Rogers' Neighborhood in October, 1966. Her early work was in production as assistant director then assistant producer. Her focus then shifted to professional development, helping early childhood educators, other professionals and parents learn about children and families through Fred

Rogers' work. Katherine Gullone currently serves at the Program Associate for Educational Projects at the Pittsburgh Association for the Education of Young Children (PAEYC) and the Fred Rogers Center for Early Learning and Children's Media at St. Vincent College. In her role, Katherine coordinates the delivery and implementation of grant-supported programs and activities with a particular focus on projects that take place in early childhood settings as well as within

the Pittsburgh Public School System. Katherine is a local, state and national speaker on early childhood research initiatives and child development. She earned a B.A. in Interpersonal Communication with a minor in Spanish from Meredith College in Raleigh, North Carolina and received her M.Ed. in Early Childhood Education from Carlow University.



Venneasha Davis is a sixth grade Science and Language Arts teacher at Woodland Hills Academy in the Woodland Hills School District. She is also the founder and facilitator of <u>Sisters e S.T.E.A.M.</u>, which is an after-school program focusing on science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics. The program seeks to empower young women and expose them to inquiry-based, hands-on science while incorporating real-world applications. Venneasha's research is primarily concerned with academic

achievement of youth in urban schools. Her work is centered on creating units that blend multiple learning styles. She earned her B.A. in Elementary Education from Point Park University and holds a dual Master's Degree in Middle School Science and Curriculum and Instruction from Walden University. Venneasha is also one of 2014-2015 "UNBOXED" teachers in Allegheny County.



Temple Lovelace, Ph.D., BCBA-D is an Associate Professor of Special Education at Duquesne University. Her research centers on the examination of the intersectionality of disability and race, with particular interest in creating and sustaining innovative, culturally-responsive academic and behavioral interventions. Over the last eight years, Temple's work with teachers and families through Teachers Leading Change (TLC) and Fusion has been chiefly focused to repairing relationships and reducing the trauma

that is felt in many educational contexts. Now in its third year, TLC is an incubator that supports a teacher's innovation and implementation of classroom-based projects that provide equitable experiences for African American students and students situated in poverty. Teachers Leading Change provided the opportunity for teachers to launch innovations such as Sisters e S.T.E.A.M. As a graduate of The Ohio State University and a doctoral-level board certified behavior analyst, Temple's research has been focused on the principles of behavior analysis and education in urban contexts. Temple is also a member of the Remake Learning Council.
